## VETERANS AFFAIRS: Sew Much Comfort event in Royal Oak makes clothing for military hospitals

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A Sew Much Comfort sewing event will be from 10:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Friday, 9-28-2012, at Haberman Fabrics, 905 S. Main St., Royal Oak.

Sew Much Comfort is an all-volunteer nonprofit organization that makes adaptive clothing customized to accommodate medical devices and situations to fit service personnel with injuries.

The clothing is sent to every military hospital in the United States, Landstuhl Medical Center in Germany and Combat Surgical Hospitals overseas. The adaptive clothing provides comfort and allows the service member to maintain their dignity, thereby helping the healing process.

Sew Much Comfort Regional Auditor Pat Quintero and her husband Bob recently visited Women's Clubs and VA Hospitals in the Upper Peninsula to make them aware of what Sew Much Comfort does.

The General Federation of Women's Clubs will help the organization with fund raising to make more clothing for wounded veterans possible.

With the holiday season approaching, Quintero would like individuals and organizations to know that they are a worthy veterans' organization to donate to, and she says contributors should know that follow-up donation requests are not sent.

Federal employees can support the organization by choosing it for their annual donation drive, and it has been investigated and approved by the Federal Government.

Sew Much Comfort is the only source for this type of altered clothing for wounded veterans.

For those who would like to contribute, Quintero says checks are most effective because the organization can buy in bulk based on immediate needs. Donations are tax deductible. All receive tax receipts. Checks should be made out to Sew Much Comfort and sent to Quintero at 22608 Poplar Court, Hazel Park, 48030.

### **AT&T donates \$10,000 to Orion Veterans Memorial**

Daniel Smith of AT&T recently presented a \$10,000 check to Chairman of the Orion Veterans Memorial Committee Dr. Joe Mastromatteo during a ceremony at the Orion Veterans Memorial.

Those in attendance included members of the Orion Veterans Memorial Committee, State Senator James Marleau, State Rep. Brad Jacobsen and Chairman of the Oakland County Commissioners Michael Gingell. Several members of North Oakland VFW post 334 attended and serve as volunteers to maintain the memorial led by the Memorial Park Manager Bob Watros

The memorial was completed on Memorial Day this year, when the central monument was unveiled and dedicated. Internationally renowned sculptor Frank Varga created the central monument, which consists of four life-size figures cast in bronze and portrays a family unit with arms around each other including a mother, father and younger sister embracing their son/brother who is in the service.

The young serviceman wears fatigues so he could be a member of any of the five armed services. Donations are still needed to pay for the monthly utility bills, electricity and water and for replacing the flags, which averages about \$700 per month.

Engraved bricks are available to honor a veteran, family or company and the income from the sale of bricks helps pay the monthly maintenance costs. Donations are also needed to establish a fund that will earn income to pay the maintenance costs.

### **Stiggy's Dogs of Howell**

Recently, The Home Depot Foundation honored veterans nonprofit Stiggy's Dogs first-place finish in the July Aprons in Action Facebook Voting Contest with a \$25,000 gift card presentation, a donation of over 50 Ryobi power tools and a full day Celebration of Service event.

Stiggy's Dogs of Howell transforms shelter dogs into individually trained psychiatric service animals for U.S. military veterans living with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder and traumatic brain injury at no cost to the veteran.

Following the award ceremony, an army of over 100 local store associates began extensive renovations to Stiggy's Dogs facilities, including wheelchair accessibility and energy efficiency modifications to the interior and exterior of the home. The Home Depot CEO Frank Blake is on site to participate in the renovation projects during the day and to recognize Stiggy's Dogs' contribution to the community and the local veterans they serve.

As a monthly Aprons in Action winner, Stiggy's Dogs will have the opportunity to compete for \$250,000 in the final round of the contest early next year.
